Annual Meeting Minutes Sunday, January 31, 2022

Minutes from 2021 Reviewed, Shari made a motion to approve the minutes, Laura Kent seconded, minutes approved.

Rectors Report:

Worship continues on Zoom and in Church. Attendance holds steady. Increase in participation in Evening Prayer. There was 1 baptism 1 reception and 7 deaths.

Enhanced air filtration installed and operational. A new thermostat was installed in the nave. A grant was received for video live streaming. The memorial garden has been used well. Effective social distancing has been practiced, Amy thanks the parish. "No spread from us!" Thank you to Karen and the finance team, also the Covid response team.

Amy also thanks Jim Lorentz and the St James Choir for their work in the past year and Sebastian for his continued tech support. Candace was thanked for coordination of readers & ushers, Tim for signage, Diana Beatty for caring for the flower beds. David Sleeper, Sherman Kent and Knox Johnson, have been responsible for management of improvements including the air filtration system.

Barbara Johnson ends her six years as Senior Warden with appreciation. Lent & Easter will hopefully proceed normally. April 16 is Easter Vigil at Mission Farm.

Bill Corson will lead a growth team. Concrete ideas will be pursued to grow the parish. Amy noted that a large pledge will expire. \$25000 is need to make up the difference. Reorganization of the diocese is in process and is vitally important.

Salaries were increased by 3%, Sari White has been working off site, and that was budgeted. Diocese support explained as a percentage of income.



Rector's Report

Dear Siblings in Christ,

If there is a theme which encapsulated 2022, it's "waking up." We began the year on somewhat of a low note. There was yet another COVID-necessitated pause of in-person activities through the season of Epiphany. In early February, a steam leak from an old radiator left behind an inch of standing water in the downstairs level of the parish house, fouled the old lath-and-plaster walls in the back stairwell, and rendered the kitchen all but unusable. However, like the princesses in the Disney versions of Snow White and Sleeping Beauty, we woke up from our long winter's nap, and launched ourselves cautiously back into the world of in-person worship and events. Spring and summer saw the first in-person Easter celebrations in three years; making good use of the outdoor spaces around the building to host regular Coffee Hours and other gatherings; and the successful continuation of the Foyer Dinner groups. Fall brought the return of regular Evensong services and the concert series; a marked increase in worship attendance; the advent of a lecture series which has successfully engaged the larger Woodstock community; and, finally, a Lessons and Carols service for the ages. Reading the Ninth Lesson, which is taken from the first chapter of the Gospel of John, with the aid of only a flashlight, gave a whole new meaning to the phrase, "the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it."

Keeping the light of this community shining amid the darkness of the world takes all of us. Through these times, we have done a remarkable job of continuing to live into our call to love God and serve our neighbors. Whether it's done within the walls of the parish itself, or out in the wider community, things like providing a meal or a ride, sending birthday cards, or donating time and money to help those in need all matter a great deal. The results may not be immediately tangible, but they are beginning to be felt every time we gather as a community. It is a wonderful thing to behold.

As has become my habit, I would like to take this space to thank some individuals who have gone above and beyond in this year of transition and change. They include:

- Karen Vitols, our treasurer, who with the assistance of assistant treasurer Laura Ken, counter Sally Garmon, and the finance team (Shari Casey, Bob O'Donnell, David Simmons, David Sleeper, and Laura Kent), has once again gone above and beyond the call of duty to ensure our resources are used wisely, and our accounting practices are in compliance with diocesan and legal requirements;
- Shari Casey and Fiona McElwain, the wardens, whose wisdom, skilled leadership, and senses of humor have proven to be a gift both to me and to the parish as a whole;
- The Rev. Betty Berlenbach, for her assistance in meeting pastoral care needs, and her willingness to share her considerable knowledge and love of teaching;
- Jim Lorenz, for his dedication to his craft and for sharing his talents with all of us in weird, often demanding, and ever-changing circumstances;
- Sebastian Lorenz and Barbara Johnson, for their technical assistance in continuing to provide live streaming of worship services;
- Hannah Forbes, parish administrator, for her ability to quickly master complex tasks, provide excellent customer service to parishioners and vendors alike, and for her willingness to share her gifts for cookie making.

We don't yet know what 2023 will have in store. As far as tangible, measurable goals, it is my hope that the increases in participation and giving will continue; that the Fair will be held; and

that the restoration of the downstairs will finally be completed. As it was last year, the question still remains: what, and how, is God calling St. James to be, in this new, getting-to-be-post-pandemic world? It will take all of us to answer it. May the God who has given us the will to perceive these things give us the power to put them into action.

Sr. Warden Report

Dear Friends and Members of St. James, Woodstock:

While preparing to write this letter for the first year of my service as Senior Warden, still wondering why I was chosen, I looked at today's (Jan 29th) 2nd reading, specifically verse 27 of St. Paul's letter to the Corinthians, and perhaps got my answer: "27 But God chose the foolish things of the world ... " Foolish or not, I am proud to say that I am associated with St James Episcopal of Woodstock, Vermont. A relative newcomer myself, I have seen a resilient congregation that has carefully emerged from the confines and restrictions of the pandemic, reinventing itself by trying new things like the Auction to raise funds for our Outreach programs while waiting for the environment to be safer for some of our more cherished traditions like the Fair. Little by little, while changing with the times, we've reached out to restore connections, firstly outdoors, working on our gardens and holding coffee hours outside, then indoors with masked, then un-masked services. At long last, we were able to sing together. Some of us looked forward to the day when we could confidently say that things were back to normal. But what is normal? During the pandemic, we embraced new ways of doing things and dealt with new challenges. For example, attendance via Zoom not only meant that we could carry on meeting together during the pandemic, it also meant that we could be more inclusive, allowing folks who might not be able to attend in person to still be a part of our St. James family. Being together on-line also meant greater flexibility, allowing folks to attend meetings despite the weather and/or distance. This was especially valuable as one of our main meeting spaces, the kitchen and basement, was ravaged by a leak. Volunteers came to the fore to form a flexible buildings and grounds team. It is important not to lose these gains, but to add them to our repertoire, to continue changing and adapting whilst holding on to our core values of community and caring.

During our journey through the pandemic, many of us found new things with which to fill our time. If we want to have our familiar habits of worship and community life at St. James restored, we will need to make room again. Many hands make light work. It is happening. Ministry Teams, Vestry, Foyer Dinners, Choir, Coffee Hours and more are back. The vestry and the Finance Team joined forces to work together during the Stewardship Pledge Drive. The Understanding Each Other lecture series and our growing partnership with Mission Farm were new initiatives. More is and can be planned. To make them happen, we're going to need volunteers. At long last, we can re-connect, renew, restore. St James has remained in our hearts. It's time to put St James back into our schedules.

From May to October the Guild uses fresh flowers and plants from their own or friends' gardens to decorate the Altar.

During Easter, with its abundance of Lilies and Daffodils and at Christmas, with their striking red and white Poinsettias, the cost of purchasing these celebratory fresh flowers for these holidays is underwritten by donations from members of the Parish. In celebration of Easter, the outside walls and urns are filled with colorful Spring bulbs, underwritten by the Flower Guild.

On other special occasions, like Memorial Services, fresh flowers will be purchased

when Family members donate their cost. The weekly Program suggests a \$50 Donation. (Some parishioners give more.)

The Fall Foliage celebration of All Saints Day is a donation from the Flower Guild. The high and low altar decorations of pumpkins and gourds, flowers, graces the Church for three weekends from the end of October into November.

During the Winter months of November through April, the Flower Guild uses artificial Flower arrangements, unless fresh flowers were requested for a Memorial Service.

We are indeed delighted to have returned to in-person services this year, where parishioners can enjoy the variety of our celebratory altar flowers both inside and out!

Pastoral Care Committee Report

This year was a more 'behind the scenes' year for the Pastoral Care Committee.

Food was cooked, cards were sent and visits made to parishioners who might not be well or are shut in and in need of a cheery voice saying hello. The organization of all this was not as formal as in past years as the committee has been in need of a Chair to pull it together and give it direction and leadership. We are currently still in need of that Chair and I would be delighted to answer any questions if anyone might be interested in volunteering.

On a regular basis Sally Garmon wonderfully continued to send cards to parishioners for their birthdays and recognition of times of need. She also, along with Mary Costella and Isabelle Bradley, came in on Mondays and re-organized the altar flowers into smaller posies which they delivered to Mertens House and the Woodstock Terrace.

Amy Spagna continued to write, call and visit those in need across a wide variety of situations.

Outreach Team Report

The Outreach Team at St James continues its focus on a broad support system for people and organizations that are local, national and international.

A new initiative this year was the decision to donate funds to help support the construction of a well in Burundi. Rev. Canon Jean Mweningoma, Dean of All Saints Cathedral and Development Officer for the Diocese of Buye in Burundi,

requested funding from St James to support the clean water project there. Clean water is a crucial part of the safety and thriving of residents worldwide. In a November email to Amy, he said, "I am pleased to send the photos of the water spring we constructed and protected with the financial support that you sent. Would you please tell your parishioners that we are so grateful to you all? I hope there will be another opportunity for supporting my ministry. May God richly bless you and your church."

We provided 24 gifts to the Woodstock Therapeutic Care Residence, an eight-bed house which places a primary focus on community integration and independent living skill development as fundamental components of each individual's journey toward sustainable recovery. Each program offers 24-hour staffing assistance to provide support, coaching, and service coordination for all individuals during their admission. This Christmas gift initiative, coordinated by Sally Garmon, invites WTCR residents to write down a few items they would like for Christmas. Sally then matches the names with members of the congregation who purchase and wrap gifts delivered to the home. One of the gifts was purchased with Fair Funds.

An ongoing Outreach initiative that involves the whole congregation is the quarterly collection of food for the Woodstock Community Food Shelf. The food shelf in Woodstock was started at St James in 1984, and the church has continued to support this important community service with food drives and funds since it moved to 217 Meadow Maxham Way. Each year, St James members provide hundreds of pounds of food to help relieve food insecurity in this community and beyond.

Deb Kappel organizes the St James participation in The Dismas House reentry program that helps citizens to transition from previously being incarcerated back

to the community, with skills to succeed. The goal is to support them navigate this challenging transition, and help them overcome the many barriers they face. It is a warm and family-like atmosphere, which is why we are encouraged to dine in at the supper and make new friends. Saint James parishioners prepare dinner once a month on the second Monday of the month, to take to Dismas House in Hartford, Vt. Dinner is served at 6:00pm-6:30pm. St James volunteers arrive at 5:30 pm to warm the food and serve. Dropping off the meal is an option as well. Typically, we have 10 for dinner including the volunteer chefs. We welcome anyone to join us in this very rewarding ministry of Saint James. Please come along!

Another important St James effort is mailing cards to parishioners. In 2022, Sally Garmon sent out 170 birthday cards, 15 get well cards and 6 sympathy cards. Outreach funds also go to the Berkeley Divinity School at Yale Divinity School and to the Chaplaincy at Dartmouth Hitchcock. Funds were given to The Diocese of Southwest Florida for Hurricane Ian relief; Shir Shalom to support a Ukrainian refugee family they have sponsored; Artistree/The Haven to support an afterschool program for Haven families

Growth Committee Report

The new Growth Ministry Team has held regular meetings with a committee of 10 parishioners composed of Vestry and non-Vestry representatives. After two brainstorming sessions in the Fall, this team identified 6 initiatives, all of which have been set into motion through a plan that includes Mission, Awareness and Hospitality. Most recently we have organized and run our successful lecture series "Understanding Each Other - Comparative Religions" which was featured twice with major articles in the Vermont Standard.

St. James Garden Report

Spring and Fall are a hive of activity in the garden St. James. A large group of volunteers come together with leaf blowers, mowers, rakes, weeding tools, edgers and pruners to tidy and somewhat tame the gardens. These clean up days offer both camaraderie and laughter as well as actual work as we move around the gardens of the church and rectory.

During the summer months a smaller group (Janet Wilson, Cecilia Hoyt, Jane Land, Tiny Mears, Diana Beattie, Lauren Corson and Fiona McElwain) maintain the existing flower and shrub gardens.

All the while Emily Mooney comes in on a weekly basis to mow the lawns and about 100 other things.....thank you Emily.

Music Ministry Report

2022 was a challenging, but rewarding year for the music ministry at Saint James. Through the spring and early summer, we saw the return of Evensong services, and with the arrival of autumn, we were able to plan a full music series for '22-'23 including concerts, special services, and fundraising events. So far, the current series has included an Evensong, a concert by Cameo Baroque which raised a significant amount of money for the local food shelf, and a Lessons and Carols service which may never be forgotten considering the "dark" turn things took.

The choir, though still modest in numbers, has seen some changes in personnel, but has maintained a similar size and voice distribution throughout the year. And as always, our choir has succeeded with music which would typically be too much for ensembles of similar size - they should be greatly commended for the work they do and the time they dedicate to make it happen!

Despite some maintenance issues with our instruments which needed tending to, both organs and the hall piano are all currently in working order. As the pipe organ nears its 40th birthday, we should be prepared to consider some larger routine maintenance and perhaps some upgrades to the winding system, filling in the

missing rank of pipes, etc. What we have is worth a great deal, but like any large, complex machine (think about your vehicle maintenance), it's best to plan to be in front of those big-ticket items from both a planning and financial consideration.

Finally, as I reached my 8th anniversary as Music Director for St James this past October, I can honestly say that I have looked back on what we have done and have felt a true pride. St James offers a great deal to our community in general, but I don't know of any other churches in the immediate area which so regularly produce great music with such regularity. That, I could not do without the entire parish's support.

NB - if you don't get the "dark" reference for the Lessons and Carols service, we lost power just after the sixth reading as we were just crawling out from under an ice storm which left thousands in the area without power for days. But, of course, we had to make things dramatic, so Woodstock lost power in the middle of the service, and the choir and congregation SANG THEIR HEARTS OUT with music illuminated by cell phone lights and candles, completing the service with no music left unsung! Take THAT Mother Nature!

Stewardship Campaign Report

The 2022 Stewardship Campaign was launched in September, with the theme 'More than Enough'. In conclusion, we are grateful to our friends and members for their continuing financial commitment to St. James.

Finance & Stewardship Ministry Team Report

The Team met monthly during 2022, via Zoom meeting, working closely with the Treasurer to monitor both income and expenses within the operating budget. Barbara Johnson led the team early in the New Year until Shari joined as leader in March. Bob O'Donnell agreed to act as deputy. David Simmons continued as Vestry representative.

Individual giving and pledge opportunities continued through the use of electronic giving features, both on the St. James website and the Diocesan website. Some folks have paid more than they pledged. With the return of in-person worship, the plate was displayed prominently at the entrance to the pews. Concerns over COVID surges meant that the plate was not physically passed until the end of the year. St. James' investment advisors (H.M. Payson) met with the Vestry and finance team, reporting that the Church portfolio remains in sound financial condition, despite the fluctuations in the marketplace due to various impacts of the global pandemic. We remain committed to working with Payson to identify and invest in socially responsible companies.
